My Experience at Mount Hermon

When Sunset Church had its recent English Congregation Retreat at Mount Hermon, I felt a sense of coming full circle in my Christian walk because it was at Mount Hermon, eight years ago, during one of their summer retreats, that I really started to understand what the Christian walk was all about. That understanding helped me to turn my life around, and led me to commit myself to attending Sunset Church more regularly, and to build more bridges with my brothers and sisters in Christ by attending small groups. It felt great to go back to Mount Hermon in September of this year, and to listen to Dr. John Coe's message of Gospel Transformation, after God had led me out of my darker, gloomier days. I'm sure Dr. Coe's message touched a lot of hearts and will have a lasting impact on the people who were fortunate enough to attend.

I appreciated how Dr. Coe broke down the problem and revealed God's solution to the dilemma that I had wrestled with for so many years. I grew up in a Christian home, was baptized at age 7, and have been attending church from as far back as I can remember. There were quite a few years, however, especially during the more difficult parenting years, when I just didn't feel the presence of God in my life, or His joy and peace. Somehow, even though I believed in Christ, I had allowed myself to become a person who did not really love people, always expected people to treat me better, kept detailed records of wrongs committed against me, and indulged in "righteous" anger. I was often impatient and unkind, selfish and prideful, and unforgiving. I fell into the trap of having all kinds of expectations of others that I made up myself, and became unhappy when people around me failed to meet those expectations (which

I thought was happening all the time.) Nothing made sense to me, especially when as a Christian, I knew I was "supposed" to feel better about my life.

Dr. Coe really did a masterful job of summarizing many of the lessons that God has been teaching me these last eight years. I had allowed myself to become a moralist who had fallen into moral formation, doing good to cover up and hide, hoping to remove the shame and guilt that I felt inside my heart. The truth is, I could never do enough to remove my own guilt; only Jesus' death on the Cross can wash away all my shame and guilt. I believed it in my head intellectually, but somehow, I had really missed the whole point and never allowed the Gospel to transform me.





In deep despair, at a very low point in my life eight years ago, I finally opened my heart to God and stopped hiding and trying to justify myself as I realized that all "my crap" (as Dr. Coe describes it) needed to be placed at the foot of the Cross. It was only at that point, when I was humbly transparent with God and willing to take a look at all my accumulated problems, that God graciously gave me a new, transformed heart, free of guilt and shame. By looking hard at my own brokenness, I finally appreciated what Christ did for me, and from that appreciation, I actually started being able to love others in their brokenness. Jesus loved me when I was unlovable. He gave me a new heart and a new purpose in life. He gave me the power and the reason to be humble, to forgive and love others with His patience and kindness.



I also appreciated Dr. Coe's teaching about praying openly to God, and not being afraid to tell God where we actually stand, as David had done so often in the Psalms. This emphasis on transparency and "taking our masks off," carried over into our small group sessions, too. It's so much easier to bear one another's burdens when we're willing to tell each other what our real burdens are.



My husband's cousins joined us at this retreat. One of them had been exposed to Christianity as a child, but has not been in Church or in a Christian setting in decades. She felt very comfortable and welcomed at the retreat. The other cousin told me afterward she was very touched by the genuine love she felt among the people from our church and she learned a great deal about our faith from the retreat. To my brothers and sisters who reached out to them, thank you so much!

As always, the singing and worship was inspirational, and everyone demonstrated outstanding teamwork to make this retreat happen. Reflections of the Vision Retreat at Mount Hermon

Change is not always linear. So when life throws you lemons, you cannot always make lemonade! Our human condition is irreparably determined. This was at the essence of Dr. John Coe's message during the three-day vision retreat. We have an incurably sinful heart.

"The heart is deceitful above all else and is incurably bad." Jeremiah 17:9

The heart is always in sin. Therefore, during this three-day retreat, John hit the right notes when he acknowledged that the most important thing Christians can aspire to is to delight in the bible as this is the secret to healing our sinful heart. Clear and powerful, the retreat gave me new insight into a refreshing perspective of a spiritual transformation journey.

"If we say we do not sin, then we deceive ourselves."

1 John 1:8

The truth is that our human tendency is to fall into sin. Our innate disposition is to dwell in our habits of sin. Worse, this disposition deceives us into thinking this is normal, even rationalizing to the point we can heal ourselves.

When asked, "How deceptive are our hearts?" John proposed we all deceive ourselves into thinking sin can be eradicated by the following:

- 1. Our will yet sin is more powerful than the weakness of our will. (i.e. Schick Center for weight loss.)
- 2. Our moralism the continent person, knows the good, but does the good with no joy.
- 3. Our obedience —the incontinent person, knows the good, but fails to do the good.



It was interesting to hear how John overcame his sinful habits. A three-week spiritual journey gave John the safety of a spiritual net to truly confront his hidden heart. Through intently focusing on his spiritual journey, John opened up his heart to allow God to be his master soul doctor.

During this time, God's intimate care for John led him in ways that enabled John's heart to deeply feel God's love, forgiveness, and truth. In the light of being honest, being fully forgiven and accepted, with a heart ready to change, God's loving relationship empowered John to work through and sort out his layers of embedded sin. During this "dark night of the soul," John discovered God's care, great affection, and mercy.

When life throws us lemons, we cannot always make lemonade. Faith is about changing the affections of the heart. During this retreat, I was impressed with the depth of duplicity of man's heart in contrast with the depth of God's pursuit for our affection. The power of His relational love can overcome sin. Loved into loving, indwelt in Christ, the Christian is a transformed person. Now set free to love God and love others, he is finally made whole — to live, love, and be loved in the way God intended.

CE Fire Drill

9:18 AM. Being a MET member. I'm here to observe. Great. The fire truck is here. The firemen are here to observe the fire drill and to give tips. The alarm goes off. The kids line up against the wall and as soon as they are in line, they are out the door, marching down towards the corner of 42nd and Lawton. Oh no! Where is the stop sign that someone should be holding up in order to stop traffic? Thank goodness that there is the teacher's assistant to direct traffic as the group crosses the intersection towards Francis Scott Kev. Last ones leaving clock out at about 3 1/2 minutes. After everyone was lined up at the school yard, Lieutenant Bruce Samson gave a short talk and complemented the group on their great job. The fireman said that any evacuation time less than 3 minutes is considered good. Total number of participants involved in the drill were 62 kids and 35 adults.

10:42AM. I am here teaching the 6th grade middle schoolers. I have ended the lesson early so that we can evacuate the moment the alarm goes off. 10:48 AM. Still waiting and the kids are getting a little antsy. Ringggg. And immediately we leave through the entrance of the annex on 43rd Ave, cross the intersection and pass in front of the church towards the school yard. Total time

evacuation for all was about 4 minutes. Total participation numbers were about 80 kids and youths and about 25 adults. The kids and youths are well prepared in evacuation drills since they do get a lot of practice in school.

Overall, an awesome job for both groups. However, I see one big concern. The earlier group had 11 infants and toddlers in the nursery and other adults had to be pulled in prior to the evacuation time to help. Had there been a real fire, can they get enough help in time? Now, what about the adults? Can they evacuate in about 5 minutes?

From the past fire drill and recent unplanned fire alarm evacuation, we have learned 1) that confusion can arise if there is insufficient helpers to direct the congregation, 2) that there needs to be room for firemen to ascend the stairs when the crowd is coming down and 3) that the emergency evacuation chair should be used for those who struggle when going down the stairs.

As a MET (Medical Emergency Training) member, we have put together a protocol for evacuation for different types of disaster i.e. fire, earthquake and tsunami. In order to be better prepared, I hope that you will not hesitate to ask any of the MET members or church staff for information. BE SAFE!

"The City Impact Gala Event helped me to understand more about the various ministries of City Impact, and how these ministries are integrated and connected to each other. In the past, I have participated in the food delivery outreach during the holidays. Recently I participated in the Adopt A Building Program and visited residents in the Padre Building that Sunset Church has adopted. At the gala event, I learned that when the volunteers visit and deliver food to the residents in the building, they discovered some residents who has physical and mental health needs, and they in turn bring the residents to the Health and Wellness Clinic to receive treatment and support!

Navigating through systems can be challenging and difficult. It is very important for volunteers to be aware of the various ministries of City Impact, so we can support the residents in a more holistic and integrated approach. It is wonderful to see City Impact's work in the Tenderloin District! It was also very encouraging to learn that the SF City Academy K-8 has grown from 30 students to 120. All 8th graders graduated and entered high school, and 85% entered college."

Prior to setting off on our various journeys to 30 homes, we were treated to an inspirational sharing by interim co-director, Faith Wirajsilp. Faith shared about a client of APC who went through a personal journey of an unplanned pregnancy, who seriously considered aborting her baby. The pressures and financial strain of having this child she thought were too much to bear. After seeing her unborn baby on the ultrasound at the APC facility, she connected with the little child within her and decided to continue the pregnancy and give birth to her child. In addition to pregnancy, postpartum, and parenting counseling, and medical support services, APC provides practical support such as providing diapers, clothing, and toy donations to its families.

After Faith's powerful sharing, the teams of Kingdom minded walkers headed out to their assigned homes with bags of toys, clothing, and school supplies, which were painstakingly assembled the day before

by volunteers. The gifts were sorted out specific to the age and gender of the children. The homes were assigned by language need and walker ability (2-3 miles or 4+ miles). I thought that I would go for the 4+ mile group since I work out 2-3 times per week. Haha. Little did I know what was in store for me that day — gigantic San Francisco hills! Our total trek was about 7 miles according to my trusty Fitbit. It was relatively flat terrain for about the first 4 miles which encompassed about 3 uphill climbs and at least 3 steep down hills. As a personal challenge I thought it would be fun to see if I could race up the steepest hill, just to get it done quicker. Oh my! Completely out of breath and with my heart racing at maximum capacity, our team completed the hills one after another.

The first home we visited was a garage in-law apartment. The family that Jesus blessed

through our team was a young Asian family. We had gifts for both mom and new born baby and we connected and conversed with them. The baby was just a week old wearing tiny mittens and completely sound asleep. The second child was an energetic boy who was happy to see our team bearing gifts for his baby brother. We parted ways after praying for the family and their journey. Assuring them that APC and Jesus were there for them to help them along the way and that the grace of God was real and we were just a little part of that mercy.

The second and final home that we visited had a mom and two young children who spoke Cantonese. Before praying and blessing the family, God nudged me to briefly engage with the two kids who were already playing with the APC gifts for them. The little boy was enthralled with his 4 inch tall Duck Dynasty bearded

figurine. I had no idea when packing that toy in the bag the day before that such a nondescript innocuous and goofy character toy could bring such joy and warm smile to a child! He likely has never seen the reality TV show, but no matter. God can use the simplest things or people to further His Kingdom work. I am not a fluent Cantonese speaker, but the kids and I connected through high-fives, the excitement generated by the gift and toys, and genuine smiles. These two families were iust two of the households that APC reached that day.

APC is so welcoming and far reaching in the community, it honors our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. When looking to invest in social justice and Kingdom service, please consider "going to the gym and getting engaged" and not just "watching a movie" of real life from a passive audience area.

The MET (Medical Emergency Team) hosted a First Aid/CPR/ AED training at church on October 1, 2016 through the American Safety & Health Institute. A motley crew of about 10-15 people woke up way too early on a Saturday morning to learn basic life saving techniques from our main instructor, Ed Fong. By the end of our six hour course, we all walked away with knowledge on how to respond in the event that someone gets sick or injured — we even have certification cards to prove it!

This was the second time I'd taken this class with Sunset Church. My first certification was exactly two years ago in 2014. Certifications expire in two years — I guess they've estimated the knowledge leakage rate from our brains to be about two years! Although I've taken the class before, I am happy to report that I have not used what I have learned. However, a side effect of not putting these skills into practice meant that I was due for a re-training. The materials I learned this time around were vaguely familiar, but I became very much aware of my need for this refresher course. Should the time come for me to actually use these skills, I would like to be as prepared and as knowledgeable as possible.

The class started off with viewing a series of rather dramatic enactments of scenarios in which one might encounter a need for first aid — like a coworker getting smashed in the head by falling boxes from a

forklift, or a child tripping over a sprinkler head and ending up with a giant gash in her arm. After watching each vignette, we practiced the skills on each other. It was kind of silly (and somewhat awkward) to pretend to be hurt while being tended to by our partners. We learned how to use an ACE bandage properly, how to care for someone suffering from an eye injury, how to place someone in the rescue position, and so on. We took a break for lunch then resumed the second half of the class with learning how to perform CPR, how to use an AED (automated external defibrillator), and how to perform the Heimlich maneuver on plastic dummies. We learned the techniques differed between adults, children, and infants. After completing the course, we took a quiz to demonstrate competency in order to get our certification.

Overall, I had a great time learning, and in some cases, relearning basic first aid skills. However, my greatest takeaway from this course is witnessing how much we are cared for by our MET Team at Sunset Church. They tirelessly carry out both intricate and mundane tasks to ensure our safety while we're at church. They restock first aid kits, taking care to pick out the cute Pooh Bear Band-Aids for our babies in the nursery. Even while we were learning, members of the MET came by the church lobby to make sure the AED was in working order! If you know someone on the team, take some time to thank them for all that they do, and for offering this class so that more people can be prepared for when an emergency does occur!

IJM's Freedom Sunday

In hope of a better life, fifteen individuals from an impoverished community in Southeast Asia borrowed loans from the owner of a lumber-cutting facility, and promised their hard work to repay their debts. These dreams for a better life were quickly shattered. Rather than allowing these lenders to repay their debts, the lumberyard owner charged false interest, bonding these workers in labor slavery for years. Forced to work 12-hour days chopping wood, these workers faced beatings if they worked too slowly or attempted to escape.

International Justice Mission (IJM) mobilized to rescue these entrapped workers on August 24. Not only did IJM free them, but also welcomed them into IJM's two-year aftercare program. With the help of local law enforcement, the lumberyard owner was arrested. Today, the survivors are safely back in their hometowns and beginning their recoveries, and the lumberyard owner will soon face trial for his crimes.

This rescue operation is just one example of how IJM works to free victims from violence, and restore their emotional, physical and spiritual health,

while also bringing abusers to justice and reforming local legal systems to ensure that such abuses do not reoccur. With 17 field offices — four in Africa, five in India, three in Latin America, and five in Southeast Asia — IJM has rescued 25,000 survivors from cycles of abuse and violence in the most vulnerable corners of the developing world. Labor bondage is only one form of violence that IJM seeks to end. Sex trafficking, sexual violence, police bru-

tality, property grabbing, and citizens' rights abuses against men, women, children, and the elderly, are other forms of oppression and violence that IJM battles each day. Still, an estimated 21 million people are not safe from violence, and IJM's work is far from complete.

By Sunset Church's steadfast and generous contributions over the years, it is clear that supporting IJM's mission is very important to you. On September 25, Sunset joined with 380 churches nationwide on Freedom Sunday, dedicating its message to the call to end injustice. To support Sunset's efforts, IJM sent Tina Min from its headquarters in Washington, D.C. to join Sunset in prayer and worship, and to answer guestions from the congregation. After Freedom Sunday, Coffee for Cause continued the charge by

pledging the proceeds it raises from October through December to IJM. So far this year, Sunset has donated over \$3,000 in funds for IJM. With the money you have wholeheartedly given. IJM can now provide access to medical care for a survivor of sexual abuse, purchase a DNA detection bluelight for undercover investigators, provide vocational training for a survivor of sex trafficking, offer legal representation for innocent prisoners, and can pay for startup costs for a widow's small business.

Social Justice at Sunset Church

I had the privilege of attending a pastors and ministry leaders evening meeting with International Justice Mission's Founder and CEO, Gary Haugen, and President, Sean Litton, on October 8th.

The highlight of the evening was sitting with and hearing the testimony of Raja Ebenezer. Raja's parents were victims of brick kiln slavery because of a \$360 loan. In 2004, at the age of 14, Raja was compelled to join them and was held captive for 2 years. Through the efforts of IJM, he and his family were rescued. Raia was able to resume his education and went on to become an attorney. Because of his experience, he decided to join the IJM legal staff to help investigate and prosecute cases of human slavery.

He shared that his mother was a Christian who constantly prayed for her family. When she became ill with much pain, Raja decided he needed to pray for his mother. When she was healed, he realized her healing and their rescue from slavery were the work of God. He subsequently became a Christian.

IJM's goal is that modern day slavery in India will cease by 2030. This also happens to be the goal of the Indian government.

One might ask, how could the Indian government tolerate the existence of illegally operating brick kilns?

Gary Haugen made an important point. Governments set up laws made with important moral standards. But, if the laws are not rightly enforced and good people do nothing, then injustice prevails.

In America, our Declaration of Independence states: We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness.

A century later, we fought a Civil War to abolish slavery and in 1898, we passed the 14th Amendment which stated: No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States .. nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

In spite of the above, injustice continued to exist.

So the fight against injustice continues.

It is wonderful to have a Christian based organization such as IJM which actively seeks out those in need to be rescued and indeed rescues them and refers them for rehabilitation/restoration. And, their oppressors are prosecuted.

IJM's staff are committed Christians who desire to obey Christ in everything. They are devoted to the God of love and justice. And, their work is upheld by daily prayer.

Tell us a little about yourself, your background, and your spiritual journey.

I was born in Hong Kong and came to the U.S. at 18. The U.S. is where I spent most of my life and established my family. My wife, Hazel, works for the state government in the finance field. Hazel and I have been married for 35 years and we have three grown children, Cindy, Derek and Emily, who are building their careers in the Bay Area. I was trained as a chemical/ bio engineer and received my Ph.D. from Columbia University in New York. Although I enjoyed a successful career, I felt that my emotional quotient was lacking. I suffered from depression after a series of turbulences in my life. During my therapy, my brother introduced me to Jesus Christ and I started to read the Bible. There I found God and saw my ignorance and sins. My wife and I trusted in Christ as our savior on the same day and we never turned back. I eventually recovered from depression and every day, I grew stronger spiritually, emotionally and physically. In 2006, I felt called by God to serve Him full time. I first served in a para-church organization, then I became a Transitional Minister at Sunset in 2012. In my spiritual journey, I learned to submit to God, humble to people, and push my limits to serve.
